

FR. BEN'S COLUMN

Saint Patrick a man of heroic faith

"I, Patrick, a sinner, very rustic, and the least of all the faithful, and very contemptible in the estimation of most men." (Opening line from St. Patrick's Confessio.)

Bishop Raymond Boland of Kansas City-St. Joseph, (some of this column is reliant on that talk) related this cute story in a talk about St. Patrick to the John Carroll Society. "There is a church in downtown Baltimore dedicated to St. Patrick. The area is no longer predominantly Irish or Catholic but the few Catholics that still live there have inherited St. Patrick's as their parish Church and school. The descendants of the Irish emigrants who established the parish have long since moved to the suburbs. On March 17, some years ago, an enterprising TV reporter, looking for something more creative than an orgy of green beer, revisited the old neighborhood and by chance interviewed a young student wearing the St. Patrick's school uniform. She was delightfully candid and unflappable in responding to the reporter's questions. 'Tell us what you know about St. Patrick, 'he cajoled, and she replied, 'I really don't know anything about St. Patrick, but he must have been a very important man because we got a day off school!'"

In the early fifth century Saint Patrick was taken to Ireland as a captive. He would return later as a bishop. At the time, Ireland was a mysterious island on the northwest edge of Europe. It was made up of huge native forests with the occasional clearing. There were no cities, or towns, or villages, just the occasional settlement. There were no roads, and people navigated mainly using rivers, the coast, or walking through the thick undergrowth of the forests. The language was foreign to Patrick and was Celtic based, with various dialects, although the Irish traded with the Romans, so they were familiar with Latin.

Ireland was never conquered by the Romans and was untouched by their administrative abilities, architecture, construction, and their religion. The Irish carried on considerable trading with Scotland, England, and Wales, as well as the continent, especially France and Spain, and with the Romans. Celtic grave goods reveal items from Italy, Rome, Germania, Eastern Europe and even Egypt and North Africa. The Irish people were of Celts and were deeply religious. They worshiped an array of gods, and their Celtic practices were in the hands of an influential priestly caste called druids. By today's standards we might call them pantheists, seeking God in nature and the mystery of the changing seasons. Oak groves, mountains, sacred hills, and rivers, provided their sacred places and wells, water being so necessary for life, was treated with reverence. There were significant cultural developments which indicated a civilized society.

St. Patrick left two written testimonies that tell us about his life in his own words. The longer work is his *Confessio*, popularly known as the Confession of St. Patrick. Written towards the end of his life, it is not a biography in the modern sense but rather a reflection on certain aspects of his life, and a meditation on the goodness of God in empowering him for the task of discipleship. His much shorter second writing is entitled *The Letter to Coroticus*. Very briefly, it is an angry letter reprimanding a British chieftain, supposedly a Christian, who had attacked and enslaved some of Patrick's converts. The letter is also one of the first known Christian writings upholding the concept of human dignity and attacking the concept of slavery.

Patrick was born in Roman Britain in a place which he called BANNAVEM TABURIAE, but its actual location is still a mystery. His date of birth was probably between 385 and 390 A.D. He describes himself in his youth as "not very religious and not very studious." At the age of sixteen, he was captured by an Irish raiding party, separated from his family, and ended up a slave on the slopes of Stemish in County Antrim, tending his master's flocks of sheep and pigs. As his Confessio indicates, it was during this six-year period that he found God, and he underwent a profound spiritual conversion.

At the age of twenty-two, he escaped and, probably by way of Gaul (modern day France) he was reunited with his family. He now felt called by God to bring the faith to the people who had imprisoned him. In many ways, his captivity had turned out to be a novitiate preparing him to know and understand the language and the customs of the people to whom he would return as a missionary. He studied for the priesthood and was duly ordained, but he did not return to Ireland immediately.

Pope Celestine sent a bishop "ad Scotos credentes in Christo" (to the Irish believing in Christ) in 431 A.D. He is known to us as PALLADIUS but almost immediately he and his mission disappeared from history. We have no idea what happened to him. A year later Patrick was appointed in his stead, and there began almost thirty years of constant evangelization as he traveled to practically every section of the island. Although it sounds almost unbelievable, Patrick and his followers converted almost the entire population of the island to Christianity during his lifetime. Patrick died in 461.

How courageous St. Patrick must have been to return to a people who took him from his family, his home, his culture, his language, and then enslaved him. How courageous it was to be willing to return to those people not to avenge himself but to save their souls. How courageous it must have been to face the opposition of the druids, the chieftains, the hardship of the environment, to start with nothing and nobody, to learn a new language, to embrace a new culture and different people.

Patrick did not condemn or ridicule his new people. He assimilated and integrated their cherished practices into a totally Christian way of understanding and practice. Their oak groves became chapels for the Eucharist; their wells became Holy Wells dedicated to the saints; their chief god and his twelve sub-gods became a perfect model for Christ and his twelve apostles. All of this was a tribute to Patrick's keen insights in his understanding of the spiritual yearnings of the people. His missionary philosophy produced a conversion of a people with one extraordinary feature: it was accomplished without bloodshed.

Who was this man and what could possibly inspire such a mission? He spent a lifetime among his captors, walked the island of Ireland, endured incredible hardships, and suffered backlash, opposition, criticism, and backbiting and yet he drove on, pressed forward, refused to give up or quit. Now that's heroic. That's what faith can do.

Interestingly, when Catholics first came here to this part of Ohio, it must have seemed very much like it did when Patrick reached Ireland. Yet, people made their homes here, started families here, and built the Church here. And like him, they also, in the face of the opposition, the difficulties, the naysayers and the obstructionists, your ancestors, built a civilization of love here. That takes faith. That takes courage. That's heroic. Today, we will do the same!

ST. DOMINIC-DELHI KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS
