FR. BEN'S COLUMN

Evangelization

friend of mine once told another friend: "If you want to get Fr. Ben to do something, you tell him not to do it," or, another version, "If you want to get Fr. Ben to do something, you tell him it can't be done."

When I went home to Ireland in July, I brought gifts with me for my nieces and nephews. What do you give to people who have everything because their parents - my brothers and sisters and their spouses, are indulgent parents? Well, something they can't easily get in Ireland, and probably something they really don't want (that's an uncle thing). So, I brought them Reds and Bengals jerseys. Obviously, these things are identified with Cincinnati, and I wanted to give them something unique while also associated with the place where I live. These shirts are designed for that very purpose - they promote the Cincinnati Reds and the Cincinnati Bengals. They are created for the purpose of spreading the word, to encourage engagement, to build support, to communicate our pride and our message. Of course, it would be better if we had a winning record, better teams, better management, better owners, better players, but having a team is already something worthwhile. Nevertheless, we support our teams, and we show our support in the messages we send, and in the colors we wear. We spread the word in order to encourage involvement and to draw people into our team support. In other words, we evangelize.

In a general context, evangelization means spreading the word or spreading a message. In religious, and in particular Christian terms, "evangelization" means spreading the Christan Gospel. Evangelization is spreading the word of the Good News of Jesus Christ and through this drawing in people to His Body, the Church. Evangelization is sowing the seed of the Gospel in hearts, minds, souls, and lives and in doing so, building up supporters, we call disciples, to carry on the same mission. However, unlike our sports teams, evangelization of the Gospel is not about simply building up support, it is about saving souls, it is about eternal salvation.

Now, you may ask, why is Fr. Ben talking about this right now. Well, some weeks ago, I received a message as part of the Beacons of Light process asking me if I had yet appointed a "Director of Evangelization." Now, you all know me, I'm a quiet, calm, slow to react to provocation, challenges, or opposition, kind of a person. Yet, I can't say I appreciate people telling me what to do, who to appoint, or how to run a parish. So, I reacted like most Irish priests, and I told the person thanks for the kind "recommendation" but I think we are doing pretty good right now, so let me get on with my mission.

To be absolutely clear, evangelization is central, it is a defining characteristic of Christianity. Jesus Himself, begins His mission by calling others to Himself: "Come, follow me he says." Then, after gathering disciples, during His own mission, Jesus commissions His disciples to go out into the world and spread the Good News of the Kingdom. At the end of His days on earth Jesus commissions all His disciples to go into the world and make disciples of all nations. In other words, all His disciples are to evangelize.

So, I, as pastor, commission all of you to be directors of evangelization. In fact, this is not even necessary as Jesus Himself commissioned you and Jesus gives you the grace to carry out this mission. All of us are to build the Kingdom of God, proclaim the Gospel, gather the sheep and the lambs into God's fold, the Church. We don't all do this in the same way: I am called to do this as your pastor (shepherd), Fr. Chris, Fr. Cordier, Fr. Walsh and Fr. Rettig are also called to evangelize as priests (shepherds), every husband

is commissioned by Jesus to evangelize his wife, to be a shepherd for her, every wife is to evangelize her husband, be a shepherd for him. Every parent is to evangelize their children, sow the seed of grace, faith, God's word, into their hearts and souls. Every grandparent is to be a shepherd to their grandchildren, every brother, sister, aunt, uncle, friend, co-worker, is to carry the Gospel into the world and share the grace and love of God. Every parish is a team that gathers in the disciples and builds them up to make the team successful, to spread the word, to carry the message, to make disciples.

We do this because this is what Jesus has asked us to do, in fact, what Jesus has commissioned, and commanded us to do. Everyone one of us is a disciple of the Lord and everyone one of us is a director of evangelization. Don't be afraid to wear your colors and proclaim your support – unlike this world, our manager can never lose, our team will win. Evangelize like it matters because it's not just about getting a great team or building up our support base, it is about saving souls and eternal salvation, life with God now and in eternity. That's something worth shouting about, that's a message worth spreading. †

CHILDREN'S LITURGY OF THE WORD

Have you ever been at 9:30 a.m. Mass on Sunday, when Father calls children up to go forth with an adult leader to hear the Word of God, and wonder what is going

on? Well, this is Children's Liturgy of the Word (CLOW)

Children's Liturgy of the Word is a worship experience geared especially for children. The Word of God has a message that is as relevant and fitting for children as it is for adults. Liturgy of the Word with Children offers an experience for the children to hear Scripture in words they understand and to share their own understanding of God's Word.

What Happens? The celebration of the Liturgy of the Word with Children follows the same structure as the Liturgy of the Word for the entire assembly. The children celebrate the Introductory Rites with their families in the large assembly. After the opening prayer, the presider invites any children wishing to participate to join the leader, a trained catechist. The children and CLOW leaders proceed to the Gathering Place where they will hear and discuss the readings from the Children's Lectionary. The children return after the Prayer of the Faithful to celebrate the Liturgy of the Eucharist with their families and the entire community. We welcome all the children to join us. Celebrating the Liturgy of the Word in this way is an empowering experience and we are so happy that we can offer this to our families.

CLOW is held during Sunday, 9:30 a.m. Mass at St. Dominic and is for children Pre-K through Third Grade. We will resume CLOW the first Sunday in October.

90th Anniversary of St. Dominic School

n Sunday, October 29, 1933, the Feast of Christ the King, Mass was offered for the first time in the newly organized parish by Fr. Grimmelsman, the founding pastor. It was offered in the Mutual Aid Hall at Greenwell and Delhi Pike, on a makeshift altar. For almost a year, Mass was offered in that temporary facility.

The first of many generous gifts from parishioners in those ninety years came from Anthony and Bernadina Robben. They offered the archbishop the six acres of land that the parish now occupies.

In January 1934, plans were made and approved to build a one-story brick building with four classrooms on the first floor and a temporary chapel in the basement, the present Teal Hall. The cost was \$27,500. On June II work began. That summer, men of the parish came in their spare time with trucks to haul dirt and fill. Bricklayers at \$.50 cents an hour soon had the walls up. On July 22, practically every Catholic in the community turned out on an extremely hot day to witness Auxiliary Bishop Joseph Albers bless the cornerstone of the new building. After the ceremony, all adjourned to the welcome shade of Joe Robben's woods to celebrate with a picnic festival. It was a gala occasion. Then on September 2, 1934, a prayer of thanksgiving rose from every heart as the first Mass was offered in the new basement chapel.

Eight days later, on September 10, 1934, St. Dominic School opened. Three Sisters of Charity taught all ninety-three students enrolled that first year. Sr. Mary Emma, the principal, taught grades six, seven, and eight, Sr. Matthew Marie, taught grades three, four, and five., and Sr. Rose Gertrude taught grades one and two. Seven little girls and nine little boys entered the first grade that year. Among them were Mary Elaine Lipps (Schoener) and George Robben.

In June of 1935, St. Dominic graduated its first class, made up of five boys; Clem Wolfer, Jr., Louis Otting, Maurice Feist, Matthew McDonough, and Louis Lipps, St. Dominic's first son to enter the priesthood.

There was a significant growth in the parish over the next eight years. An addition was added to the first building in 1938. This included a chapel with a kitchen and dining room in the basement. (The present principal's office and Tile Hall.)

On October 9, 1938, the congregation gathered for Mass in the new Chapel.

By 1942, another four-classroom wing was added to the North end of the original building to accommodate the now one hundred and eighty students. All of these building projects cost money. The parishioners held card parties and famous chicken dinners to help with the building costs.

After the war, the real building boom hit Delhi Township. Farm after farm was subdivided and new streets put through. Delhi was changing from a rural to a suburban community. Traffic on the roads which the children used to walk was becoming heavier. In 1948, a school bus committee was formed and for years St. Dominic had its own school bus service.

St. Dominic School rushed to keep pace with the building boom and increasing enrollment. So much of the history of the first twenty-five years of the parish involved the expanding school. A new wing and gymnasium and convent were added to the campus. Families grew from seventy to one thousand one hundred. School enrollment grew from ninety-three to an all-time high of one thousand one hundred and sixty-seven in 1967.

The Sisters of Charity played a major part in the growth and development of St. Dominic parish. The Sisters staffed our school for seventy of the ninety years. They taught our children and were a major influence on the goodness we experience in this parish. Sr. Patrick Ann O'Conner was a major leader in this parish, serving as principal of our school and teacher here for many years.

For ninety years, graduates of St. Dominic have watched their grandchildren graduate from our Blue Ribbon School, they have watched them serve Mass, they have watched them compete on our athletic teams and have watched them grow into responsible adults.

A special thank-you to all the teachers and generous parishioners who have helped us pass on the Catholic Faith to generations of St. Dominic children! Happy Birthday St. Dominic School!
